

The Greenville Homeless Alliance set out in 2022 to help Greenville County residents better understand what homelessness looks like locally so that our community is equipped to make decisions about policies, practices, and resources that help prevent and end homelessness.

We kicked off the year with our five **Working Groups and Steering Committee** unanimously agreeing on our direction and contributing their time, expertise, and lived experiences to help implement our Strategic Plan. We released the **2021 Report on Homelessness** with updates to data, stories, and areas of progress made by Greenville since the initial report released by GHA in 2019. Listening sessions were held with more than 60 different organizations and 120 individuals to develop the **GHA COVID-19 Brief** addendum. We held 4 in-person **Stakeholder meetings** in partnership with the Upstate Continuum of Care featuring topics including youth homelessness and the tools necessary to build affordable housing. This year also marked our second **iGNITE luncheon** showcasing the important role we all have in creating a connected community. The pre-event activities included the release of **GHA's Mythbuster video series** and a partnership with GVLtoday that dramatically increased GHA's social media exposure which resulted in growth across all five GHA social media platforms.

Thank you to our Partners and Stakeholders for your contributions. Thank you for recognizing the collective power we have to solve complex issues when we all work together as a connected community.



GHA continues to serve as a convener, connecting organizations and individuals that sometimes aren't even aware of one another, to educate the community, advocate for change, and collaborate to find innovative solutions to help end homelessness.

CONNECTED COMMUNITY

This year's iGNITE luncheon was truly a collaborative effort. It included the unveiling of a collaborative art project created in partnership with Triune Mercy Center's Art Room, an <u>original poem from local artist Moody Black</u>, and <u>mini-documentaries</u> created by students from Bob Jones University's Department of Cinematic Arts featuring men and women who have experienced homelessness and the direct service organizations that have walked alongside them. There were 14 speakers, 16 volunteers, 6 singers, and more than 76 Partner organizations represented in the event.

Why is this important? Because it is a direct reflection of who the Greenville Homeless Alliance is and what we do. We are a convener, a collaborator, a connector of people, organizations, and ideas with one purpose...to end homelessness for individuals, couples, and families in our community. WORKING GROUP HIGHLIGHTS

In 2022, more than 70 stakeholders from 55 different organizations participated in Working Groups. These groups were created to implement GHA's strategic plan. Here are a few highlights:

The **ADVOCATE WORKING GROUP** focused efforts this year on refining the <u>Advocacy Training Academy</u> curriculum and delivery. They also added a new advocacy workbook for participants. The Academy was developed

to increase the number of local residents who understand and are willing to engage in advocacy that impacts homelessness in Greenville County. In August, the Sterling Neighborhood Association hosted



GHA's Advocacy Training Academy at the Sterling Community
Center. More than thirty neighbors, church partners, and community leaders participated in the session that included insight from City
Councilmember At Large Dorothy
Dowe about advocacy efforts that have been impactful to her as an elected official.



The **INNOVATE WORKING GROUP** focused on **building relationships with the faith community** which increased engagement by 70%. They also **improved the understanding of housing resources** and **potential funding streams** to help simplify the path to housing stability for individuals.

couples, families, and youth experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness. Members worked to update the **Housing Resource Guide** ensuring properties near Greenlink routes were noted. In September, they hosted a **Biblical Justice Forum** for members of the faith community in Greenville County whose place of worship is in close proximity to one of the 86





Greenville County Schools that had children and their families self report experiencing homelessness during the 2021-22 school year.

The **COLLABORATE WORKING GROUP's** primary goal this year was to begin developing a **Homelessness Resource Guide** to help simplify the path from

homelessness to stability for individuals, couples, families, and youth. This resource will be usable by those experiencing homelessness and be valuable to those who may be walking alongside them, like a librarian or store merchant, by providing key information on how to connect to

resources that help create stability. Data was collected through an extensive survey process which also gathered information used in GHA's COVID-19 Brief.

The **EDUCATE WORKING GROUP** created and produced a <u>Mythbuster video series</u> and <u>quiz</u> to address common misperceptions about homelessness in our community. They also led the effort to educate and engage a larger community audience by developing a **social media squad** and strategy prior to the 2022 iGNITE luncheon. This effort coupled with a partnership with GVLtoday increased GHA's social media following by 50%.



The **OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE WORKING GROUP** focused efforts in 2022 on working with GHA
Staff and Steering Committee to **update and implement a new governance policy** to strengthen the unique role
of GHA as convener, collaborator, and connector.
Continued focus on Supporting Partners has resulted in a
stronger year-to-date financial position.

Thank you to everyone who attended our 2nd annual **iGNITE Luncheon** which included 160 people in person at Grace Church and more than 200 virtual viewers. Whether you participated in the program, helped create a tiny painted house, one-of-a-kind ornament, or educational video, were featured in a Story of Hope on a banner, supported us as a sponsor, or attended in-person or virtually, we hope you caught the vision of the power of a connected community. **Many thanks to all the sponsors that made this event possible.**

This year's event celebrated how GHA Partners and Stakeholders ignite change in our community every day. It featured stories of success from men and women who've experienced homelessness and the organizations that helped them find hope. Speakers also shared "ignite moments" - the many different ways to engage with GHA and help end homelessness in Greenville County.

MORE 2022 HIGHLIGHTS

- GHA released the 2021 Report on Homelessness in April which provided updates to both data and areas of progress made by Greenville since the initial report released by GHA in 2019. The Report was shared with Councils from all 6 municipalities, Greenville County Council, and the Greenville County School Board of Trustees.
- Findings from listening sessions with more than 60 different organizations and 120 individuals were shared July 28 in the <u>GHA COVID-19 Brief</u> (an addendum to the 2021 Report on Homelessness).
- GHA sent out 8 Call to Action
 emails to encourage stakeholders to
 engage in advocacy that impacts
 homelessness in Greenville County.
 The goal is to ultimately affect
 policies, practices, and resources in
 a way that increases options for
 individuals and families experiencing
 homelessness in our community.













- GHA worked on advocacy issues
 ranging from affordable housing and
 eviction to fair lending and Homeless
 Court alongside community partners
 including Greenville Affordable
 Housing Coalition, Fair Lending
 Alliance, Impact Greenville, Greater
 Greenville Good, and Village Engage.
- GHA participated in 12 different partnerships and coalitions in Greenville County.
- GHA saw an increase in Partners, Stakeholders, social media engagement, and web inquiries.
- Four quarterly <u>Stakeholder meetings</u> were held with the Upstate Continuum of Care.
- This year GHA staff and Partners led more than 50 educational field trips and presentations for local churches, schools, social workers, hospitals, School Improvement Councils, universities, businesses, and elected officials.
